IF the Kiwis are on top of the world given recent successes by Adore Me and their cricket team, than Dexter Dunn must be King of the world.

He is, after all, a world champion after his success in last week's World Driving Championship which concluded at Tabcorp Park Menangle on Sunday.

Not content with holding an unbeatable lead going into the final race on Inter Dominion Grand Final day, Dunn came out and blew them off the park, again, in the final race with an outstanding win with Global View from the Darren Hancock barn.

That gave Dunn the title of 2015 World Driving Champion

after competing in 20 heats against nine of the best harness racing drivers from all around the world.

From the 20 heats held at Tabcorp Park Menangle, Newcastle, Wagga, Bathurst and Penrith, Dunn won five, had six seconds and three thirds.

He won the series with a record 200 points, an amount that has never been reached in a World Driving Championship before.

Dunn, who is just 25, joins fellow Kiwi horsemen Kevin Holmes, Robert Cameron, Maurice McKendry, Tony Herlihy and Mark Jones as winners of this series since it was first contested in 1970.

"It is only just sinking in because this is the sort of thing you don't expect to happen so early in your career," Dunn said.

Dunn returned home on Monday night and will now settle back into the swing of things in New Zealand as he looks to wind up what will be his eighth consecutive national drivers' premiership.

With 125 New Zealand wins next to his name, Dunn has a 60 win buffer on his nearest rival, Blair Orange.

The final race wasn't exactly expected to go Dunn's way, but what the heck – let's finish it in style, must have been what this wonder reinsman figures.

France's Tony Le Beller drove the favourite Our Hi Jinx and was expected to be involved in the battle for the early lead but with a lot of speed coming from horses drawn wider on the track he got shuffled back early.

Heza Thrill driven by Spain's Guillermo Adrover worked from the widest draw to find the front and led turning for home but after a strong tempo it was a horse racing just off the pace that proved too strong.

Dunn brought Global View with a well-timed run to break the track record for 2400m, recording a mile rate of 1:53.4.

Second was Heza Thrill and Guillermo Adrover, El Rama finished third with Norway's Vidar Hop while Im Blue Double Dee was fourth with Pierre Vercruysse in the sulky.

It was a remarkable performance by Dunn made even more remarkable when you consider he was in ninth position after five heats before a strong performance at Wagga Wagga on the Tuesday night saw him soar up the leaderboard.
