HARNESS RACING - GETTING BACK TO GRASS ROOTS


In 2014-15 under the guidance of Queensland's Racing Operations Manager David Aldred, Racing Queensland successfully reestablished harness racing in venues and regions where it has been missing for many years. After a hiatus of 13 years, harness racing returned to the Royal Queensland Show in 2014.

The success of the Trots at the Ekka quickly sparked a response from other regional Queensland Show Societies and David met with Queensland Shows CEO Mark Bryant to hatch a plan for the future. David was invited to address an audience of Show administrators at the 2014 Showman's Guild annual general meeting. After making a presentation, Secretaries were quick to book the trots and to pledge funds for prizemoney for harness racing to return to their annual Shows. The result was that in 2014-15 I a total of 15 days of Show harness racing were conducted in southern Queensland.

In addition to the shows the Racing Operations team at Racing Queensland also established a grass track racing circuit with TAB and non-TAB harness race meetings successfully conducted at Brisbane and country Queensland thoroughbred racetracks during 2014-15.

The show and grass track racing series are the forerunner of many more successful events of this type to come.

Show Racing 2014 -15

Big crowds, exciting racing and outstanding performances and good old fashion fun at the races, the 2014-15 Show Racing circuit had it all.

Racing Queensland, Redcliffe Harness Racing Club, Albion Park Harness Racing Club and local sponsors banded together to support 10 days of harness racing at the Show which climaxed with the Garrard's Big Dog \$10,000 Show Grand Final on the final day.

The Brisbane Ekka is an event which attracts over half a million (500,000) people and what a fantastic way to promote our product.

Top class broadcasting talent announced the races and talked up the harness racing at every opportunity and all races were televised on the big screen trackside so everyone knew that the harness

racing was going on. The calling team included David Fowler, Matt Hill, Damien Courtney, John Brasch and David Aldred.

On the feature Saturday night of racing (Day 9 of the Ekka), the standardbreds, both pacers and trotters, darted around the 400 metre track in the main arena before a packed house with an estimated 30,000 people watching.

Spectators crammed into vantage points in the John McDonald Stand, Ernest Baynes Stand, Members Stand, Council Reserve, Machinery Hill, Cattleman's Bar, Hill Suites, Gregory Terrace Reserve and anywhere else they could get a glimpse, just to watch the races.

When the horses were competing, the crowd, many watching harness racing for the first time, were all fans. Young and old picking their favourites and hollering the horses names. All races were displayed on the big screen making sure spectators didn't miss a second of the action.

The response from the industry and the audiences every day of the 2015 Ekka was fantastic. Royal Queensland Show ringmaster Ms. Jan McMillan said it was tremendous to have trotting back at the show and quickly booked the event again for 2015.

Grass Track Racing 2014 -15

From humble beginnings at the start of the season grass track harness racing in Queensland is now attracting full fields for both pacing and trotting races. Grass track racing has been conducted as standalone harness racing meetings at Deagon, and Warwick and at dual code race thoroughbred and harness race meetings at Kilcoy and Beaudesert. Big Crowds have attended the race days at all venues with carnival-like crowds getting to the Deagon harness race day sponsored by the Sandgate Chamber Of Commerce and supported by the Brisbane Race Club, Redcliffe Harness Racing Club and Racing Queensland. Entertainment and family activities made the day a big hit woith the community and participants alike.

The Darling Downs Harness Racing Club, as well as hosting show racing at the Toowoomba Show hosted a fantastic Grass Track raceday at the thoroughbred's Allman Park racecourse on Father's Day. With Bookies and on course tote betting the day attracted great support from the local community with all races sponsored, fashions on the field, children's entertainment, mini trotting and on track competitions. \$5000 was raised on the day to support cancer charities. The inaugural 2014 day was so successful that the event was scheduled as a TAB/Sky race day in 2015.

The Kilcoy Race Club puts on the best country race days in south east Queensland with patrons lining up for the famous Kilcoy steak burgers. They also love harness racing at Kilcoy with club officials stating that there is more interest and wagering for the harness racing than the thoroughbred races at their dual code race meetings. Kilcoy now host three grass track dual code race meetings a year. In 2014 they attracted great support for the annual Vietnam Veterans race day at which there were three TAB harness races run in August. Supported by the Kilcoy RSL, the day attracted a big crowd including Vietnam veterans and returned serviceman from Afghanistan and Iraq. The harness races at Beaudesert were conducted at the Club's annual Hibernian Club charity race day in May and were showcased in front of a big crowd in attendance at the thoroughbred race track.



THE EKKA TROTS HAD IT ALL

Big crowds, exciting racing and outstanding performances, the 2015

Ten days of harness racing around a tight 400m track at an event that attracted more than half-a-million people – what a fantastic way to promote our product.

The standardbreds raced before a packed house on the final Saturday night, with an estimated 30,000 people cramming into vantage points to watch the races.

When the horses were competing, they were all fans, young and old picking their favourites and hollering the names. And it seemed the louder the crowd cheered, the faster the horses ran.

"Isn't this fantastic? The competitors, from the kids racing in the mini trotting to our veterans of racing competing for the prizemoney, have done us all proud and the people watching have loved every minute of it " Ekka sponsor Chris 'CJ' Garrard beamed

Sisters Lola and Julie Weidemann and their niece Stacey dominated the race list and the results. Lola drove 12 race winners including the \$10,000 Grand Final winner, Julie drove six winners including victories in two consolation finals and Stacey drove

three winners. Julie completely owned the Trainer's title, winning 22 races.

The Garrard's Big Dog Grand Final on the last Sunday night of the show was everything it promised to be.

On paper it looked like the Weidemanns would go one, two in the grand final – and that's the way it turned out. But the race was far from black and white.

In an exciting mid-race move, Lola shifted her charge, Mister Elegant, into top gear and he steamed around the outside of the field to take control of the race from last year's grand final winner Lonesome Mach, driven by Julie. The tactic put Ricky Gordon driving Miss Catalina in a pocket and three lengths barely separated the five horses.



After completing four laps, Mister Elegant held a one-length margin on Lonesome Mach with Miss Catalina one-and-a-quarter lengths away in third. The other two finalists, Its You Not Me (Noel Parrish) and Dutch Cream

Mister Elegant was a star at the Show and his winning time for the Grand Final mile was 2:08:4, with each lap averaging 32.1 seconds. Mister Elegant, a five-year-old gelding by TylerB stallion Miles McCool, has won almost \$90,000 at registered race meetings. During the show he greeted the judge first four times

The Weidemann's also harnessed up the Horse of The Show, Mister Armageddon. The six-year-old son of Trump Casino scored three wins, two seconds and a third from six starts at the Ekka.

The mini trotters from the Queensland Junior Harness Racing Association raced at the final three days of the show.

Royal Queensland Show ringmaster Jar McMillan said it was tremendous to have trotting back at the show.

"The response from industry and the audiences has been fantastic. We look forward to having the trots back next year,"

GYMPIE BACKS HARNESS RACING

Gympie Turf Club is ready to back harness racing again after the trots proved to be a hit with fans at Saturday's Zinc 96 FM Family raceday at Southside in July.

For the first time in many years Gympie punters were treated to harness racing, with the club conducting three pacing races following the annual thoroughbred card. Club president Spencer Slatter said plans are already afoot for the club to receive sponsorship funds for a full harness race card at the club's Melbourne Cup Day meeting.

"Having the trots on our family raceday was definitely an added bonus and we are hoping to organise funding to have our first stand-alone harness race day at Gympie on Melbourne Cup day," Slatter said.

"Due to the huge volume of thoroughbred racing and the shortage of jockeys on Melbourne Cup day, in recent years we've resorted to a bit of a novelty with camel races. But harness racing is looking like a good alternative to that.

"The club will need to look at the benefits of assisting with the funding of the prizemoney and hopefully we will be in a position to make a decision shortly."

Slatter said there was a real party atmosphere at Southside and everyone enjoyed the addition of the trots.

"The drivers seemed to enjoy it too," Slatter said.

"We didn't have to do a lot to the sand after the gallops, it all worked out pretty well for everyone."

Art Major filly Somethings Sizzling broke her duck, closing the raceday with a 12m victory over race favourite Wheres Sarah Now.


Driven by trainer Mick Logan, Somethings Sizzling led from start to finish. The filly, raced by the Brisbane Pastoral Company, is a granddaughter of Pelagic Miss who produced Time Square, a 1:53:4 winner in North America and a prolific winner in Western Australia.

Eight-year-old Mach Three gelding Weasel scored its first win in 17 months, carving out the quickest time of the day on the Gympie sand. Weasel is approaching \$100,000 in lifetime stakes but these days his wins are few and far between.

Trained and driven by John Kerr, Weasel was the \$15 rank outsider in the six-horse field. However, Weasel seemed to relish the alternate surface and held a 4.3m winning break on Red Castle Warrior (Kevin Annetts) with a big space back to the rest of the field.

Hez To Blame, trained and driven by Noel Parrish also ended a losing streak with a 16m win over the race favourite, Cloncullen, (Jamie Donovan). Hez To Blame, a Western Edition gelding that had been winless from its previous 16 starts, scored in the slowest time of the three races run. -



After more than 100 races, the club would like to thank everyone involved. We hope all members enjoyed themselves.


The club's oldest member, Amber, has reached the retirement age of 16 and, after the completion of our show season, will assist the club with non-driving activities.


The QMTSAI has been enjoying a busy couple of months with show season in full swing.

The aptly named Highview Sign's victory on the first day of the two-day Young Drivers Invitation Series at Marburg set Clifton driver Stacey Weidemann on her way to a heartfelt win in the Championship and it was likely that she had her biggest supporter smiling from above.

Claiming the Mitavite Marburg Ipswich West Championship title last month meant a lot to Stacey, so much so she paid a special tribute to her pop soon after the final race

In March this year the Weidemann family lost harness racing stalwart, Ross Weidemann.

"My biggest supporter didn't get to witness me take the honours, but I sure hope he's got a smile on his dial up there," Stacey said.

"Poppy was my biggest fan. He always was behind me telling me to have a go. I do miss that."

Stacey (24) also congratulated the Marburg Pacing Association for the event and thanked the sponsors, Mitavite and the Ipswich City Council.

A niece of harness racing sisters Julie and Lola Weidemann, Stacey didn't get a winner at Marburg on the second day of competition but her drives were competitive enough for the concession driver to take out the 2015 title.

"The horses I drove during the Championship raced well and I was appreciative the trainers were encouraging. They were really good with no pressure – that helps," Stacey said.

On day one, Stacey drove one winner, Highview Sign and a third-placed Fiscal Cliff and went into the final day of competition just ahead of Hayden Barnes, who also got a good start in the series with a winner Wecanonlyhope and a fourth placed Eternal Glory. Really, Stacey only needed to place better than Hayden in the two races to stay on top of the leaderboard.

Queensland young guns Brittany Graham and Trent Moffat jetted into New York in July and quickly settled in nicely to racing US style.

The two winners of the Centenary Classic Mercedes Benz (Toowong) Young Achievers Award at last year's RQ Industry Awards, commenced their one-month educational prize in July filling in the bulk of their days in North America at expat Aussie trainer Ross Croghan's Gateway Farms, New Jersey.

"What an amazing place," Graham said. There are about 600 horses on the property, which is privately owned, and trainers rent barns

Moffat made his North American driving debut on July 11, partnering Feels Like

Magic at Yonkers Raceway. Moffat raced against the top drivers in the US in the race. The very next day Graham drove in two official qualifiers at The Meadowlands.

"I just loved driving at the 'Big M'," Graham said.

Graham and Moffat also got the opportunity to drive the standardbred world's highest ever stakes winner, Foiled Again at Gateway Farms. In June, the 11-year-old Foiled Again took his lifetime earnings to in excess of \$7 million.

Graham was excited to drive Foiled Again but said he was one of the most lackadaisical horses on the training track that she has worked.

"He might be the fastest pacer I've ever driven, but he is also the slowest jogger on the track," Graham said.

The educational prize of the trip to the US was the brainchild of Queensland's young guns 'supremo', Kevin Seymour. With the assistance of Albion Park Harness racing manager, Damian Raedler, Racing Queensland management and management at The Meadowlands, Seymour was able to initiate a harness racing educational trip of a life-time for the star young drivers.

The duo is being mentored by Croghan and the team at Gateway Farms in all facets of training and driving.

Not one to rest on his laurels, Seymour has already selected another two young Queensland drivers, Danielle McMullen and Nathan Barnes, to be educated in Canada next month.




It was a case of history repeating with the third race quinella the same in order as the second, with Chocolates third for a delighted Ethan Casey.









Harness Racing will be back at the Royal Queensland Show next month with local pacers set to thrill new and old audiences when they scurry around the tight quarter mile track in the main show arena.

It was just last year that harness racing made a big comeback at the Brisbane Ekka after an absence of a dozen years. The Trots had been, up until 2002 a ring event draw card at the RNA Show with the promotion extending to just about every other regional show around the state.

This year, Racing Queensland, Redcliffe Harness Racing Club, Albion Park Harness Racing Club and local sponsors will support 10 days of harness racing at the Show which will climax with the Garrards Big Dog \$10,000 Show Grand Final on Sunday 16 August.

Show fanatics Lola and Julie Weidemann are guaranteed to be back with their team of pacers after winning the major prize last year with Lonesome Mach, a

seven-year-old 164 start-veteran which is also likely to be back in the show arena to defend his title after returning to winning form at Tamworth this month. A FORMER tradition will be revived in Toowoomba this month when trot racing returns to the Royal Show.

Trotting will end its lengthy absence from the Toowoomba Showgrounds with racing taking place on each day of the March 19-20-21 show.

Darling Downs Harness Racing Club president Anthony Collins said industry members have welcomed its show comeback and organisers are hoping it can help open the door for more regular meetings.

Hot to trot at Ekka

IF it were not for a case of a rogue horse and an unpaid debt, harness racing may have missed out on one of the sport's leading families.

Forty-five years ago, Ross Weidemann, from the Darling Downs, was attempting to recover some money he had loaned.

Unable to repay the debt, the man proposed something else to Ross instead.

"There's this horse here," he said. "Do you want a trotter?"

Though Ross had experience in hack horses, he had never tried his hand at harness racing.

"'I'll give it a go," Ross replied, accepting the man's offer as payment. As it turned out, the horse Ross received, named Nicky Peter, was a bit of a rogue with a mind of its own.

None-the-less, Nicky Peter won a few races and Ross soon fell in love with the sport.

His passion was passed on to his wife Marion, daughters Julie and Lola, and granddaughter Stacy - three generations of Weidemann women who are proving they are hot to trot.

Of the women, Lola does the majority of the driving and has driven more than 2700 winners in her career.

Her older sister Julie has trained more than 2200 winners. Julie's skill saw her recognised with the Harness Racing Australia JD Watts Award for Australia's leading trainer in 1998. She was also named Queensland's leading trainer in 2004 and 2005.

At 23 years old, Stacey Weidemann is quickly making her mark on the industry, guided by her aunts.

Show trotting returned to the Ekka last year after a 13-year hiatus. This is where Stacey began her harness-racing career, driving her first unofficial winner in front of a cheering crowd.

Amid the screaming fans was her grandfather Ross, who sadly passed away in March this year.

The whole family was pleased to see racing return to the Ekka.

"We have been racing for as long as I can remember and coming to the Ekka since I was a little girl," Lola said.

The atmosphere in show arenas was something to be contended with, she said.

"At the Brisbane show, it definitely feels a little special. It is your royal country, your top-notch show - you get a buzz.

"It's a different feeling at shows to your normal races every week. You don't hear any excitement at regular tracks when you win, but in the grandstand at show, the crowd fully backs you."

Lola said the Ekka was a great introduction to competitive racing for Stacey.

"The Ekka is the perfect time as she not only learns about racing, but gets used to a busy show and how to cope with lots of people."

Harness racing's return to Ekka has seen a resurgence in the sport at agricultural shows across Queensland.

Brett Rail, Queensland Racing's chief handicapper for harness racing, said they were pleased to be in the "early stages of a show racing comeback".

Since Ekka 2014, the trots returned to Toowoomba Royal Show in March, Nanango in April and Gympie in May, with Caboolture and Nambour shows in June.

"I think the crowds who have been to some of these shows have been fantastic," Mr Rail said.

"The racing brings a lot of entertainment and excitement to the shows. There's been a lot of crowd involvement."

But despite the many awards, trophies and prizemoney they have won, trotting triumph is about much more to the Weidemann family than simply crossing the line first.

"Years ago, you could buy cheap horses, improve them and win money. You'd race them, turn them out," Lola said.

"It was a personal achievement to get something out of that horse that others couldn't."

The family will return to the show in 2015 and Ekka guests can watch on as the Weidemann women compete for \$10,000 in prizemoney.

The trots will be on daily in the Energex Community Arena from 12-12.45pm, with finals each night from 6.30pm as part of the spectacular EkkaNITES entertainment.

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
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



"Events like this are working very well for harness racing here, the grass track circuit and the trotting show circuit are reintroducing harness racing to audiences in our regional areas and sparking plenty of interest. "Just last weekend harness racing was featured on television on Channel 7's Great South East lifestyle program with the Weideman family promoting the Brisbane Ekka show harnessracing and the segment ran for several minutes."

The dual code Gympie race meeting commences with thoroughbred racing up to 3pm when the sand track will be watered and rolled to prepare for the three harness races. which will get under way about 3.50pm. The upstairs area of the Bill Bishop building, above the betting ring, will be utilised as a corporate area. Meanwhile there will also be a number of market stalls set up on the day to further enhance the picnic theme of the race meeting.

As it is a family orientated race day all patrons under 18 will get in free, however the entry for adults will be \$12 with \$2 going towards the Wish List foundation.

There will be face painting, balloon twisters, a jumping castle and an opportunity for kids to meet the Disney characters from the film Frozen.

Teleha's mum, Roslyn Bell, is extremely happy for her daughter.


"She's the only one going from Queensland," she said.

Hot to trot



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6 It is your royal country, your top-notch show – you get a buzz

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IF it were not for a case of a rogue horse and an unpaid debt, harness racing may have missed out on one of the sport 's leading families.

Forty-five years ago, Ross Weidemann, from the Darling Downs, was attempting to recover some money he had loaned.

Unable to repay the debt, the man proposed something else to Ross instead.

"There 's this horse here, "he said. "Do you want a trotter?"

Though Ross had experience in hack horses, he had never tried his hand at harness racing.

"I'll give it a go, "Ross replied, accepting the man 's offer as payment. As it turned out, the horse Ross received, named Nicky Peter, was a bit of a rogue with a mind of its own.

None-the-less, Nicky Peter won a few races and Ross soon fell in love with the sport.



His passion was passed on to his wife Marion, daughters Julie and Lola, and granddaughter Stacy - three generations of Weidemann women who are proving they are hot to trot.

Of the women, Lola does the majority of the driving and has driven more than 2700 winners in her career.

Her older sister Julie has trained more than 2200 winners. Julie 's skill saw her recognised with the Harness Racing Australia JD Watts Award for Australia 's leading trainer in 1998. She was also named Queensland 's leading trainer in 2004 and 2005.

At 23 years old, Stacey Weidemann is quickly making her mark on the industry, guided by her aunts.

Show trotting returned to the Ekka last year after a 13-year hiatus. This is where Stacey began her harness-racing career, driving her first unofficial winner in front of a cheering crowd.

Amid the screaming fans was her grandfather Ross, who sadly passed away in March this year.

The whole family was pleased to see racing return to the Ekka.

"We have been racing for as long as I can remember and coming to the Ekka since I was a little girl, "Lola said.

The atmosphere in show arenas was something to be contended with, she said.

"At the Brisbane show, it definitely feels a little special. It is your royal country, your top-notch show - you get a buzz.

"It 's a different feeling at shows to your normal races every week. You don 't hear any excitement at regular tracks when you win, but in the grandstand at show, the crowd fully backs you."

Lola said the Ekka was a great introduction to competitive racing for Stacey.

"The Ekka is the perfect time as she not only learns about racing, but gets used to a busy show and how to cope with lots of people. "

Harness racing 's return to Ekka has seen a resurgence in the sport at agricultural shows across Queensland.

Brett Rail, Queensland Racing 's chief handicapper for harness racing, said they were pleased to be in the "early stages of a show racing comeback".

Since Ekka 2014, the trots returned to Toowoomba Royal Show in March, Nanango in April and Gympie in May, with Caboolture and Nambour shows in June.

"I think the crowds who have been to some of these shows have been fantastic, " Mr Rail said.

"The racing brings a lot of entertainment and excitement to the shows. There 's been a lot of crowd involvement."

But despite the many awards, trophies and prizemoney they have won, trotting triumph is about much more to the Weidemann family than simply crossing the line first.

"Years ago, you could buy cheap horses, improve them and win money. You 'd race them, turn them out, "Lola said.

"It was a personal achievement to get something out of that horse that others couldn 't. "

The family will return to the show in 2015 and Ekka guests can watch on as the Weidemann women compete for \$10,000 in prizemoney.
